It is not several washs since an interesting article appeared in "The Age" (Nov. 19) that related to the early history and settlement of land now contained in the State of Victoria.

Writers quite frequently produce articles about the early settlement around Fort Philip Tay or Fortland, but it is a rare thing to see reference to the pioneer cattle on that were quietly and unobtrucively exploring and settling in the Tastern highlands of the region, at the same time as pioneers like Messrs. Fathan, Fawkner and the Hentys were establishing themselves on the mainland.

Several explorers are reported to have been in the (meo district in 1334 and cattle were brought there marly in 1835.

It must be a serious oversight in historiaal recording when men like the Buckleys, crorland, Livingstone and Pendergasts and others whose early pioneering efforts all predate the famous exploration of Aajor Thomas Mitchell in 1835, are not given more prominence.

Sinceethe State of Victoria and Fountain Cattlemen are both commencing a 150 year anniversary, it would be appropriate if the exploits of these 'founding fathers' and their associates, were made better known for posterity sake.
