MAN FROM SNOWY RIVER - CRAIGS HUT RESTORED

Craig's Hut, one of Australia's most internationally recognised images, was a symbol of what much of Australia is all about, according to Conservation and Environment Minister, Mark Birrell.

Re-opening the hut, first built 10 years ago at Clear Hills, east of Mansfield for the filming of The Man from Snowy River, Mr. Birrell paid tribute to thos involved in its restoration.

Constructed as a film set only and not intended for permanent use, the hut had gradually fallen into disrepair. The Mansfield Alpine Four Wheel Drive Club took on the daunting challenge of organising teams of workers to demolish the structure and rebuild it as a shelter hut with its original facade.

Located on an exposed grassy ridge, 4 kms east of the summit of Mt Stirling, the hut looks over the King River valley, with spectacular views across the mountain ranges.

Craig's Hut had become an icon of Australia, recognised overseas, Mr Birrell told a crowd of about 250 people who made the four-weel drive journey to the re-opening of the hut on Sunday 11th April 1993. He said it was a symbol of the Australian way of life - the outdoors, the high country, a spirit of co-operation and hard work.

The restoration was carried out in rugged and extreme weather conditions over the past few months and ensured that one of Victoria's most popular tourist attractions will be preserved for many years to come. (Courtesy Mansfield Courier).

BOOK NEWS

MCAV CONTRIBUTES TO 'REVUE DE GEOGRAPHIE ALPINE - LES ALPES AUSTRALIENNES'.

In June 1991 MCAV was contacted by Dr. Philippe Grenier of the Laboratoire de la Montagne Alpine at the University of Grenoble who was in Australia on behalf of the French Ministry of Environment to prepare a report on the management issues of the Australian Alps.

Despite a lack of enthusiasm on the part of the New South Wales National Parks and Wildlife Service which was assisting with the production of the report, Dr. Grenier managed to contact the Association and arranged a meeting in June 1991 at which we agreed to contribute a chapter to the Revue.

The papers provided to Dr. Grenier were published by the University of Grenoble as a full journal volume, in both French and English, and in March this year, were distributed to a readership of subscribers, academics, scientists and resource managers as well as university and research institute libraries in 50 countries.

As the preface to this volume states:

"For the Revue de Geographie Alpine, founded in 1913 by Raoul Blanchard and thus one of the oldest French geographic reviews, it has become almost a tradition to devote certain issues to mountain areas situated outside the European Alps. Among the most recent examples are the special numbers on the Caucasus in 1981, the Argentinian Andes in 1988 and the Saharan mountains in 1991. This special double issue on the Australian Alps is a further example of our desire to perpetuate this tradition....."

Chapter 17 of the Revue was prepared by the MCAV and very many thanks to Debbie Squires and Linda Barraclough for their assistance and editing. The chapter entitled "Cattle grazing in the Victorian Alpine Area 1835 - 1991 and onwared" covers a brief history of mountain grazing, the cattlemen's use of fire as a management tool, the beginning of the decline in mountain grazing, the formation of the MCAV, a question of scientific or ideological arguments, observations of the alpine environment, MCAV view on land management, a brief comparison with Kosciusko National Park, the MCAV in the 1980's, and finally a section on the cattlemens' role as part of Australia's national heritage.
