MEMBERS - GRAZING LICENCE FEES 1992/93

member of the Association has had a problem with accounts for his 1992/93 grazing season. Although his licence allocation is for some 300 odd, he took only 180 or so cattle to the high country last season. for these cattle at the correct subsequently received an account from the Department for a further amount being the balance of the allocation. In other words, the Department in this case, charged for the allocation, and not the number of cattle sent. We believe this to be mistake, and have brought the matter to the attention of the Minister and Department. The Minister's attitude is that cattlemen should not have to pay for cattle not sent up. We are waiting for a formal reply from the Department. other cattlemen have been charged in this way, could you please contact Sue Silvers 057 751 600 urgently.

FAREWELL TO CLIVE HODGE

Clive and Marion have moved from Valencia Creek to the Tumbarumba area. This has meant that Clive will no longer continue as a Central Council member for Gippsland Branch, and will be sorely missed from Council. Clive will maintain his high country grazing licence however, and will remain a member of the Gippsland Branch. the last meeting of the Council, Jim Commins spoke warmly of Clive's long connection with the Mountain Cattlemens Association. In fact Clive had been one of the founding fathers of the Association, had held office as a senior Vice President for many years, and had been a member of the Central Council for 20 years. Clive had worked tirelessly for the Association, and was one of the main organisers of the famous Parliament House ride September of 1984. Whilst he noted that Clive would remain as an active member of the MCAV, in presenting Clive with a beautiful painting by Associate member John Duncan Firth, Jim thanked him for his work and dedication to the Association.

In thanking Jim, Clive compared working with the MCAV to being part of a top football team, and urged the Association to continue to kick the right way. He assured the members that they had not really got rid of him and that he would be "hanging around like a hungry dog"!

PRESENTATION OF LIFE MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATE TO MR JACK TREASURE.

In November last year at a Central Council meeting in Dargo, the Association presented a Life Membership Certificate to Mr. Jack Treasure. Although Mr. Treasure had been appointed a Life Member many years ago the practice of marking the occasion with a certificate is of recent times.

President, Doug Treasure, introduced Mr and Mrs Jack Treasure to the meeting and gave a brief history of how Mr Treasure had seen the phase out of grazing in the Kosciusko National Park would eventually be proposed for the Victorian alpine area, and had decided that the only way the Mountain Cattlemen would survive was to be united. Mr. Treasure formed the Mountain District Cattlemens Association in the late 1960's, and was its first President. Mr. Treasure had also seen that the way to spread the message regarding mountain grazing was to produce a magazine, and he therefore produced and published the first, and subsequent early copies of the Voice of the Mountains. It was through the vision and forethought of Jack Treasure that cattle are still grazing in the alpine and subalpine areas of Victoria.

Doug Treasure presented his uncle Jack with his Certificate to the applause of the Central Council and visitors.

Powerscourt - Maffra. The restaurant is in the former ballroom of a historic mansion, renovated and transformed Its hospitable into a charming country house retreat. owners have built it up over four years, and although might be out of the way for Melburnians, restaurant is so popular with locals that it is now open six nights a week. Pre-dinner drinks are served in a cosy lounge, and then diners are ushered to elegant tables where they will be served delicious food that makes excellent use of local produce. There will be fish from Lakes Entrance, fine Gippsland veal, venison and poultry, and perhaps local berries in season. We recommend the pheasant, should it be available. wine list includes many hard-to-find wines from East Gippsland. Sunday lunch is a very affordable treat, and gives you a chance to enjoy the sweeping views from the old property, which once extended to Maffra.

The long driveway is impressive, but the historic homestead is even better. It is a wonderful building on a 48 hectare grazing property with panoramic views of the Gippsland plains. There are seven individually decorated guest rooms, all with private facilities, the more expensive rooms are at the front of the house, looking out on to sweeping lawn and big Gippsland horizons. It would be possible to use Powerscourt as a touring base for the area, but many guests will prefer to luxuriate in the surroundings and the country hospitality.

What a fantastic prize for a raffle! And what a delightful get-away for the lucky winner.

OBITUARY - NOEL SCHULTZ.

The following are excerpts from an Obituary printed in Wangaratta High School Newsletter. Mr. Schultz had been connected with the school for many years.

'Students loved their days with Noel Schultz and they were given an insight into many aspects of life that were seldom available within the classroom, for Noel brought to Wangaratta High School a wide experience as a mountain cattleman. The High Plains roundup of cattle is an annual event and Noel, with the approval of the school, joined the other great names of the mountains for this annual roundup, an event he had taken part in since the age of 14.

In 1988 Noel was forced to retire after major heart surgery, but despite this he continued to assist the school on a regular basis. He came with a joke and a smile and always brightened the day of all who came in contact with him. In February of this year Noel suffered another major illness and was given a short time to live, but as with all aspects of his life, this time was extended by the great will to live he demonstrated, and the loving care of his wife - June, and family. He had a final trip to the High Plains and saw the sunset over his beloved alps and he managed a day or two fishing the Mitta with his grandchildren. Last week he finally succumbed after a brave battle".

The Wangaratta High School will remember Noel Schultz most fondly, as indeed, will members of the Mountain Cattlemens Association of Victoria which extends to his wife and family its respect and sympathy.
