## SPIRIT OF THE OUTBACK - NIGEL AUSTIN'S BOOK.

The mountain cattlemen of Victoria feature in a beautifully illustrated new book about the Australian cattle industry which will be of interest to all in the beef sector.

The Spirit of the Outback, by Nigel Austin, with colour photographs by Leon Mead, covers all sections of the beef industry from cattlemen to end markets and highlights the different cattle regions and many of the nation's main producers.

Chapters of interest to members and associate members include an insightful article about the valuable environmental role played by mountain cattlemen in looking after the country, and others about Cobungra Station, and the Stoney family.

The book includes a number of stories about other well known Victorian

cattle families, including the Lawsons from YthanBrae near Yea, Werribee Agriculture, Mel Gibson's Beartooth Ranch at Tangambalanga, Jim Allen from the South Boorook Hereford Stud, the Gubbins from Te Mania Angus Stud, and Paddy Handbury.

The inspirational book captures the essence of Australia's vast outback regions and the people who live there. Appropriately, it has been launched in Australia's Year of the Outback and includes a foreword by Bruce Campbell, founder and chairman of the year.

It magnificently captures the spirit of hardworking men and women of the cattle industry. It also highlights the colour and passion of the Australian people - a proud people with a deep love for their land and their work. It is the story of settlemen of inland Australia, its ongoing development and new land uses.

By focussing on the pioneers, the heros and the many contemporary families who are helping to shape the outback, it vividly illustrates this vital core of the nation's identity and image.

The Spirit of the Outback covers the cattle industry from one end of Australia to the other, with stories on many of the nation's largest and most innovative cattle producers. In writing the book Nigel Austin has visited many of the most interesting, most isolated and largest stations in this vast land.

He provides a compelling insight into the crucial economic contributions of outback Australia. The \$7 billion a year cattle industry is the nations largest rural business and the basis for the existence of many people in the outback. ### PETER RABBIT INVADES THE ALPINE NATIONAL PARK. WILL MR McGREGOR BE ABLE TO DEAL WITH HIM OR NOT?

Simon Turner is one member of a volunteer group who have been maintaining fencing in the Park as part of a research project on brumbies.

On a recent field trip the group found a rabbit warren near to their research project. Concerned, they approached the local Parks Victoria ranger and asked whether, on their next trip, they could take some chemical with them and fumigate the burrows. We all know that rabbits can multiply in vast numbers in a short time. This group of volunteers thought it would be a sensible and helpful thing tc get rid of rabbits in the Park.

Unfotunately this was not to be the case.

The ranger denied permission to fumigate the burrows on the grounds that there could be public liability issues, but more importantly there had to be a 'strategy' developed. Firstly the size of the rabbit population had to be determined (tricky since it could double in the blink of an eye), secondly the extent of the warren had to be determined, and then the warrens needed to be located using a global positioning system. Terrific!!! This is the sort of problem users of the National Parks in Victoria face. It is the responsibility of Parks Victoria to protect the conservation values of the Park. Clearly this has gone by the We all know what rabbits, left board own devices. their do to to conservation values. When a group of volunteers, several with certificates to use chemicals offer to do the work for Parks Victoria, they are frustrated by all the mind boggling red tape which is required before a simple task can be undertaken.

The last thing anybody, Parks Victoria, or Park users want is for a bunch of people going about the Park with pockets full of chemicals.

However this issue was approached in a proper commonsense manner, with permission first being sought.

### ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS ARE DUE AT THE END OF JULY.

An invoice is included with this Newsletter. The next two years will be crucial to the mountain cattlemen. Grazing licences are due for renewal in August 2005. The policy of the Australian Labor Party is to remove all grazing from the National Park. A document received from Parks Victoria this week states:

> "With respect to management of grazing in the Alpine National Park as a whole:

The Victorian Governments policy was to investigate the options for removal of grazing from the Park, and the Government's investigation was in its preliminary stages."

The importance of keeping your subs up to date cannot be too strongly stressed. Particularly at this time. The amount of work to be done to counter moves to remove grazing and the mountain cattlemen from the high country is immense. This work cannot be done without the proper funding. And funding comes from you!
