A new record for attendance at a ball in Mansfield was set on Friday night last, when six hundred patrons packed the enlarged St Mary's Ballroom to capacity for the annual Parish Ball. The new gallery also had its accommodation fully taxed and was much appreciated by the onlookers, who were able to enjoy the night in comfort.

The hall was tastefully decorated with late autumn berries and artificial flowers, and had as a centre piece a gaily-lighted Dutch mill, through the door of which the debutantes entered to be presented to the Shire President (Cr. Cummins) and Mrs Cummins.

There was the usual tense atmosphere of anticipation prior to the presentation of the debs., and although the crowd were enjoying the excellent music of Frank Johnson's Band and B. Clancy's Orchestra, the air of expectancy was evident as they awaited the highlight of the night.

The debutants were preceded by little Ann O'Toole and Stephen O'Brien, in Dutch costume, who presented a lovely bouquet to Mrs Cummins. They presented a picture of indescribable beauty as they were presented in the following order:-
